Board of Governors Annual Message to Parent/Carers of Blackwood Primary School

Dear Parents and Carers,

We are, once again, delighted to present you with the 2021-22 Governors Annual Report to Parents. After the challenges of the COVID pandemic it has been wonderful to return to the normality of pupils able to attend their school for a full academic year and to continue their learning journey together whilst inviting parents and carers back onto the school premises.

Blackwood Primary staff have continued to work extremely hard to prepare the school for the implementation of the new Curriculum for Wales with September 2022 being a key milestone date. The school has worked throughout 2021-22 academic year to fully design the school's Inspire curriculum and continue the excellent work on maintaining inspirational learning environments for all pupils. The school continues to deliver as a Regional Lead Pioneer school, trailblazing the way in embedding the new Curriculum for Wales. We are also very pleased that the school has continued to work as a Lead School for Cardiff Metropolitan University which has enabled us to welcome trainee teachers to the school, providing a great benefit for the school, teaching staff and pupils. Additionally, the strength of the Blackwood cluster's collaborative working has been recognised as excellent practice and they have presented to others on their collective progression on the Curriculum for Wales work.

The 2021-22 academic year has continued to see improvements at the school in the outdoor learning environment. A new kitchen and community room has been completed and work on the outdoor learning environment has continued with improvements made in Nursery and Year 1 to ensure an all-weather outdoor classroom environment. The Inspire Radio Station was also installed at the school providing a fantastic opportunity for Blackwood pupils to run their own radio shows across the school.

The academic year ended on a high as families were invited back into the school to experience the welcome return of the annual Sports Day event. Friends of Blackwood Primary and governors set up a collective stall offering refreshments. It was such a pleasure to see the happiness and enjoyment on the faces of all the pupils and of parents, carers and grandparents as they watched.

Looking ahead to the 2022-23 academic year we look forward to the opportunity for more engagement with families and the Blackwood Primary Community.

The Governing Body would like to thank all staff at the school for all their relentless hard work and for the achievement of another successful year.

School information

Blackwood Primary is a local authority maintained primary school within Caerphilly County Borough Council and the school sits within the Islwyn region, working in a cluster with Blackwood Comprehensive School and five other primary schools — Cefn Fforest, Fleur-de-Lys Primary, Libanus, Markham and Pengam. At Blackwood Primary school we share a commitment to the development of the whole child. Our total class count of pupils, as at 30th April 2022, was 441, which includes nursery provision. Blackwood Primary School has 15 classes and has a two-form entry (Nursery Am and PM are counted as one class). Nearly all children come from non-Welsh speaking families and, as at 30 April 2022, 4.08% of pupils used English as an additional language. 31% of our children were eligible for free school meals (Y1-Y6) and the Free School Meal status was 24.7% of statutory school age. Additionally, 15.9% of the school population were recorded as having Additional Learning Needs.

We pride ourselves on being an inclusive primary school family, supporting and encouraging all our staff and pupils to achieve their potential. We ensure all stakeholders have a voice in decision making and have the opportunity to improve all aspects of school life. We aim to ensure that everyone has the same chances and opportunities irrespective of race, sex, religion or belief, sexual orientation, class or disability. We believe that by working together and consulting with all our stakeholders, everyone feels valued and included - a key factor for school improvement. Our school mission statement continues to be 'United we, Empower, Nurture and Challenge, Wrth uno mae'n ein arfogi i feithrin a herio.' We strive in all aspects of school life to be a continuous, self-improving learning community, aiming for excellence in all we do

Curriculum

Blackwood Primary is leading the way on the roll out of the New Curriculum for Wales. In July 2023 parents and carers were sent details of our INSPIRE curriculum and this has been followed up with in-person events in October 2022. Blackwood Primary's INSPIRE curriculum has been designed with the involvement of all key stakeholders. The four purposes are fully reflected in the design to ensure that our learners are ambitious, enterprising, ethical and healthy citizens. Health and wellbeing is a priority and learning environments at our school have been designed with this in mind. Inset Days

As per Welsh Government legislation the entitlement to a set number of non-teaching inset days forms part of the statutory 'School Teachers' Pay and Conditions (Wales) Document (STPC(W)D)'. Inset days are used for a variety of professional learning and school development activities. These activities may take place on the school premises with specialist external training consultants, off site via a variety of online mediums, or using prior worked Twilight sessions.

The decision on the dates of the inset days is made by each individual head teacher and will vary from school to school. They are sometimes governed by the availability of external training availability. Our inset days are notified to our school community in advance via our school Newsletter, school website and via the Caerphilly Council website."

Our Governing Body and Terms of Office

The Governing Body and the Headteacher share responsibility for the strategic management of the school. Whilst the Governing Body provides strategic leadership, challenge, and support, the Headteacher is responsible for internal organisation, management, and control of the school. The full Governing Body meets at least once a term, usually more frequently. In addition, subcommittees meet to discuss specific issues and report back to the Governing Body on a regular basis. School and LA policies are reviewed by the Governing Body each term on a rolling basis.

Governor Learning Walks

With the COVID restrictions eased, Summer Term 2022 gave the Governing Body an important opportunity to attend the school to undertake learning walks and engage with staff and pupils.

Governors were split into two groups and explored both the Early Years and Key Stage 2 learning environments. Checklists were completed to record the results of the learning and provide suggestions for improvement. The overall conclusion was that the learning environments, both indoor and outdoor were extremely impressive, Blackwood Primary's INSPIRE curriculum was evident throughout all classrooms and pupils were fully informed, aware of and engaged in their learning.

At the end of the learning walks governors had the opportunity to sit down with representatives from the Pupil Parliament. Pupils displayed the work that they had undertaken throughout the year, and it was absolutely wonderful to see the motivation and pride on their faces.



STEM Day

It was great to restart the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) day activities in school with our STEM link governor. Half day sessions were held with year 6 in April and year 3 in May this year. An introduction to engineering and the built environment was provided followed by a series of group activities based on a real project in South Wales. The project was linked with the summer term topics of living things and their habitats and human activities and their impacts on the natural world, with the presentation tailored to each year group.



The first activity tasked the groups to think about what types of plants and animals that may be present on site and after these were confirmed back to the group, they had to place where they would be found on site, using the large-scale printed plans. A discussion followed about the impact of the development on the wildlife and what needs to be considered as designers.

For the next activities, the project brief was explained further, including the provision of new football and rugby pitches together with floodlighting and a new internal swimming pool. Provided with scale cut outs of the proposed pitches, the groups were tasked about where the pitches were best placed to make the best use of the site and to avoid negative impacts on the wildlife. The third task involved further spatial planning to fit a new swimming pool within the existing building. The pupils were tasked with thinking outside the box but to consider the effects of the proposed solutions.



Finally, a discussion on energy use and reducing carbon was held and an experiment demonstrating the impact of improving insulation and air tightness was undertaken. This involved 4 jars — one control jar, one with insulation (a sock!), one with improved air tightness (the lid on) and one jar with both insulation and improved air tightness. The temperature of hot water in the jars was recorded at the start and after a time period. This helped the pupils understand how both insulation and air tightness helps against heat loss, reducing carbon and energy bills. Hopefully the pupils enjoyed the activities as much as us and show that STEM careers are for everyone. We look forward to meeting up with the STEM pupil ambassadors this academic year and linking a project to their term topics for the next STEM activities.

Welsh Language Provision Datblygu'r Iaith Cymraeg

The Criw Cymraeg meet on a regular basis. This year they helped to change the display in the main hall to showcase different Welsh artists with contributions from each year group. The Criw also helped to organise this year's St David's Day / Dydd Gwyl Dewi celebrations where certificates were awarded for challenges set in different categories such as cooking and creative tasks. To promote the use of Welsh Language in the classroom, weekly certificates, designed by Criw Cymraeg, have been awarded to the best Welsh speaker in each class. All year groups have a 'Cwtsh Cymraeg' where Welsh books, magazines, dictionaries, language mats and activities are incorporated to make Welsh learning fun. We also have a map of Wales where year groups will be given mini projects to complete and present e.g. castles, places and people.

Extra-curricular clubs

Due to COVID restrictions there were limits on extra-curricular activities during the 2021-22 academic year. However, school were able to commence Taekwando and Football clubs during the summer term. The Autumn term of 2022 has started with a full and exciting suite of extra-curricular clubs which has been extremely popular with all pupils.
